

#### Leap of Faith

Today's Gospel could be seen as an example of what St. Paul is explaining in the second reading. Since death came into the world with the sin of Adam, Christ's death saved us from sin and his resurrection saves us from death. And since Christ had to die before he could rise, the last enemy to be subjected is death; so too do we have to die before we can rise. When all this happens, God will be seen in all of creation. Jesus will be seen as equal to God, not just a man, but the Son of God. The Gospel gives us the image of a king on his throne, surrounded by his subjects. And then comes the final judgment.

I always thought the point of this parable was that we recognize God in the poor, the sick, the homeless, prisoners, etc. But the people in the parable who helped all those in need did not recognize Christ in the needy. That's why he tells them that whatever we do for "these least ones," we do for Christ.

That is actually good news, because it is not always easy to recognize Christ in others. I used to think that once I start seeing Christ in all people, I'll be more willing to help them. But it also works the other way. When you

death-row prisoner or a homeless family, we take that leap of faith to help, not because we see Christ in them but just because they need help. Remember, God forgives and saves us because we need God, not because we deserve it. Tom Schmidt

### Pastor's Letter

Dear Family:

On this last Sunday of the liturgical year, we reflect on the day when we will meet Christ face to face. Our reflection began two Sundays ago when the readings encouraged us to be prepared. Last week, the readings invited us to consider how we have spent the time waiting for Christ. This weeks' readings add another nuance: Did we recognize that Christ was always with us, especially in the poor?

As the first reading and psalm reveal, the God of Israel always had special interest in the needs of the poor. Time and again, God instructed Israel not to let the poor suffer, to render just judgments for widows and orphans, to feed the hungry, and - as the prophet Ezekiel writes in this Sunday's first reading - to seek out the lost and heal the injured. As this Sunday's psalm shows, biblical literature turns repeatedly to images of God as shepherd. People recognized the care that shepherds provided their flocks, and many people experienced a similar care in the love of God.

Paul reminds Christians that those who belong to Christ must follow his example with their actions. The church as a body leads us in caring for the poor and tending the sick, but individual Christians have a responsibility to do the same as far as their means allow. It is easy to think that concern for the least is merely one good way to symbolize interior salvation, but that is not what this Sunday's Gospel teaches. Matthew insists that care for the least is an encounter with Christ himself, and that it prepares us for the day when we meet Christ face to face.

In Matthew's mind, only those who seek Christ in gritty and painful realities like homelessness, hunger, illness, and imprisonment will be recognized by him when he comes in glory.

Some questions for reflection:

How have you encountered Christ in the poor?

How have you sought out the lost?

In the Gospel reading, neither group recognized Christ in the poor. Who do you suppose the righteous continued to serve the needs of the poor?

At our Vigil Mass on Saturday we will be celebrating the Rite of Acceptance. This simple ritual within our Eucharistic celebration is for those seeking full communion in our Catholic Church. Here they take their first steps advancing to their goal of being one with us at the Table of the Lord Jesus. Please remember to keep them and our RCIA Team in your prayers.

Please don't forget that directly after our Vigil Mass next Saturday you are all invited to our Annual Open House at the Rectory. A BIG thanks to all those who helped decorate the Rectory for the Holy Season. Hope to see you there.




