



A Good Day to Die

Do you remember your own baptism? I wish I could. I envy the adults I have seen baptized at the Easter Vigil. Hopefully, they experience what St. Paul says in the epistle we hear at the Vigil. For Paul, Baptism is a sign of dying and rising to new life. Does that mean we will rise from the dead, too?

Yes, but that is not his main point. If all we think about is our physical death, and hope we go to heaven afterwards, we're missing the point. The new life starts with our baptism, not just our physical death. The water is both cleansing and a sign of dying (symbolic drowning) that help us see we are free from sin. We are dead to sin when we begin to live in Christ. The fictional Klingons have a saying "today is a good day to die" to express courage in battle. But real Christians might say that Easter is a good day to die to sin and live in Christ.

How do we experience this dying to sin? First, we identify the sinful areas of our life. Do I watch movies, or video games that encourage promiscuity, revenge, or selfishness? What sins do I confess repeatedly and what can I do to avoid them? As for living in Christ: Can I spend less time entertaining myself and more time in prayer? Instead of complaining about what is wrong with the world, can I find ways to make it better? These are a few of the ways we begin our new life in Christ.



Pastor's Letter

March 31, 2024

Dear Family:

Acts 10 (our first reading) emphasizes our roles as witnesses to share the Good News of Jesus' resurrection, but there are times when we struggle to understand the meaning of the empty tomb.

Not only is the word tomb repeated seven times in today's Gospel reading, but the gloomy mood is already set with Mary Magdalene going to the tomb "while it was still dark". Jn 20:1

Mary Magdalene sees the open tomb and concludes that some people have removed Jesus' body, so she runs to inform Peter and the "other disciple whom Jesus loved" (Jn 20:1-2), who may represent Gentile or John's Christian community, or everyone who is loved by Jesus. When Peter and the beloved disciple take turns to enter the empty tomb, they only see linen wrappings and a face cloth, which is neatly "rolled up in a separate place" (Jn 20:7). This signals that the empty tomb is not a result of theft or robbery.

Upon entering the tomb, the beloved disciple "saw and believed" (Jn: 20:8), but we are not told exactly what he believed. Things become even more baffling when we next read that "they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead" (Jn 20:9). The change to a plural third-person pronoun logically includes both Peter and the beloved disciple, although we read nothing about Peter's reaction of belief. We also don't know if Mary even went into the empty tomb.

Three disciples came to the empty tomb after Jesus' resurrection. They did not see any angels or receive any messages. One saw an open tomb and jumped to a wrong conclusion. Two saw the strips of cloth inside the tomb and left without understanding, even though one is said to have believed.

Some questions for reflection:

Why does John's Gospel give us the details about a footrace to the empty tomb?

Why does our Gospel reading end at John 20:9 rather than continuing with the passage where the resurrected Jesus appears to Mary Magdalene and calls her by name?

In the time and space between an empty tomb and the appearance of the resurrected Jesus, what do you see or need to understand?

Historical Tidbit About Catholicism in Iberville Parish and St. John the Evangelist Catholic Church

Who was Fr. Harnais whose gravestone is in the middle aisle of the church?

Fr. Mathurin G. Harnais served as pastor of St. John the Evangelist Church from 1878-1905. He was well known as eminently a just man, outspoken in all his relations with his fellowmen in public as well as in private life. He was not always appreciated during his lifetime, but at his funeral, held on February 11 in a real downpour of rain, was the greatest triumph mortal man could give him. All Plaquemine, whether Jew, Protestant or Catholic, mourned his passing for all that he had done for them in faith.

When Fr. Harnais arrived in Plaquemine at night by riverboat on January 29, 1878, there were no sidewalks or streetlights to guide him to the church. The wharf keeper, Trasimond Rivet, accompanied him by lantern to the structurally failing church, a hut for the rectory, no school and a disgruntled congregation that were poor from the aftermath of the Civil War and burdened with paying the diocese back for the church. A determined man, he planned on reinforcing the church walls that summer but a yellow fever epidemic broke out. By 1879, he was able to get the support of the congregation for repairs, raising the interior with reinforced walls from 24 to 40 feet, building the sacristy and installing the church tower.

He used his own money to purchase the land and build the first true rectory. It was built large enough to house teachers that would teach in the Catholic school. In 1882 St. John Free School for boys opened as well as St. Augustine Colored School. Tuition was free and paid by fairs and fund raisers. The rectory was remodeled to house the school temporarily while a two-storied school was built and completed in 1887. His school students never ceased talking about the famous wooden shoes the good priest used to wear and the not very gentle application of these same shoes to their anatomy!

Improvements to the church continued with stained glass windows, chandeliers and four of the statues still in the church today. In 1885 a large bell, named Joannes Maria, was christened and hung in the church tower. A second bell, Anna, was installed in 1888. New Stations of the Cross were installed in 1889. In 1890 pews were installed, and the tower remodeled. Auctioning of the pews conducted by Joseph A. Grace raised the needed funds for over 60 years. In 1896 the Altar Society, oldest organization of the church, donated the "gong" thought to be the sanctus bell used today.

Mass attendance swelled due to the zeal of Fr. Harnais and the debt was paid off by 1904. Under his administration, the Knights of Columbus, Council #970, was created in 1905, only the third in Louisiana. Dr. W. L. Grace was elected its first Grand Knight.

In 1890 Archbishop of New Orleans Francis Janssens made Fr. Harnais an "immovable pastor" of St. John the Evangelist and an Honorary Canon of the Cathedral in 1896.


